

EVENT NEWS

The annual Barry Conservation District Tree Sale was the first activity at the Park on April 15th and 16th with many trees sold and picked up during the event.

The first County Wide Yard Sale of the 2011 season was on April 30th, this was the first of four for the summer. 15 vendors set up by the Gas & Steam Barn, due to the wet ground closer to the village, and there were many shoppers throughout the day. At the same time Spring Into The Past (museums tour) was taking place April 30th and May 1st. Visitors were able to wander the village buildings and visit other local museums. Attendance numbers were difficult to determine Saturday, but SITP drew approximately 50 people on Sunday, the highest attendance we have had!
