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#### **EVENT NEWS**

Boy, what a difference comfortable temperatures can make! Our summer events have blossomed this year with the beautiful weather we have experienced. A welcome change from the high-90° days of last year.

The 31<sup>st</sup> Annual 4<sup>th</sup> of July & Veterans BBQ was truly a beautiful day this year. Over 600 people enjoyed the barbecue buffet, watched the flag raising by the American Legion, and participated in games on the Village Green. Seven pies were donated for the pie auction, with proceeds going back to the Park to cover the costs of the event. Elaine Drury served

lemonade in the Bristol Inn; Laura McBeth and Judith Kidder provided interpretation in the buildings; Andy Johnston served as event MC; Ann Replo-



gle, Melia Timm, Pam Tobias, and Kim Long served as place keepers for the games; and Jean Gallup, Brian Reynolds, and Kim Long acted as pie judges. Thanks again to Jeff Van Nortwick for his wonderful portrayal of Uncle Sam and to everyone who came out to help us celebrate!

The 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual Gas & Steam Show was held on July 12 and 13. More than 825 spectators came out to enjoy sawmill, threshing and shingling demonstrations; plus, sweet corn steamed by the Westinghouse, tractor games, and a parade on both days. New this year was a tractor pull on our new pulling track down near the River Lot – thanks to Daryl Cheeseman for all of his hard work putting that together. Thanks to Lois Bremer, John Foley, Tim Hamel, Beck Helgeson, Judith Kidder, Joe Medendorp, Ann and Alexis Replogle, Pam Tobias, and James Tyler for their help in the village, and thanks to all of the Gas & Steam Club members for making the event such a success!!

This is a special year for the sesquicentennial of the Civil War – it is sesquicentennial year of the Battle of Gettysburg! The Civil War Muster on July 20 and 21 was well attended by 540 visitors and 322 re-enactors. Visitors browsed Sutler's Row, talked to the re-enactors at their camps, listened to Abe Lincoln speak in the Church, watched a fashion show on the front porch of the Upjohn House, viewed an artillery demonstration down by the river, saw battles both at High Meadows (Saturday morning) and in the village (both days), played old-fashioned

games on the Village Green, joined in a barn dance Saturday evening, witnessed an evening artillery firing (photo) and walked through the re-enactor camps and village by candlelight.

The July 27 Yard Sale was attended by 23 vendors and lots of eager shoppers. Also that day, the Antique Outboard Motor show delighted boating enthusiasts at the Recreation area. August Fest was held on August 17. The event featured gorgeous weather, hundreds of guests, a yard sale with 38 vendors plus an antique car show with 43 vehicles exhibited. More than 35 trophies and plaques were awarded the car owners and numerous door prizes were given out. Special thanks to Barry County Commissioner, Howard "Hoot" Gibson for his assistance with all of the yard sales.

Over 1,000 participants and spectators came out to enjoy the 2013 Great Lakes Longbow Invitational on August 9-11. The weather was remarkably different than it was in the past for this event – it was gorgeous all three days! There were several 3D shooting courses through the woods around the village, the Sherwood Challenge, kids' shooting areas, and even a small wedding in the church on Saturday morning. Thanks to volunteers Jack Boarts, Dave Chase, Kendra Friend, Judith Kidder, Dan Harrow, and Paul Leavitt for their assistance in staffing the village buildings and keeping an eye on the grounds.



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#### **EDUCATION**

Three groups came out this summer for education programs, whether to make soup, butter, and candles, or to experience a guided tour throughout the whole village. Thanks to Kendra Friend, Elaine Drury, John Gallagher, and Steve Evans for assisting with these groups.

Our young friends from the ExploreMore program returned to Charlton Park on August 8 to complete the second session of the program. The students



had a great time drawing the church basement to scale, putting together paper houses and making a neighborhood for them (photo), and con-

structing free-standing models of different styles of architecture using unconventional items.

The Old Fashioned Field Days continued on July 24 and August 14 (photo). Overall, we had 37 chil-

dren and their 12 adults come out and play with us this summer! Thanks to Beck Helgeson for facilitating the first two Field Days, and to Melia Timm for volunteering her time for all three Field Days and assisting wherever necessary.

#### **COLLECTIONS & EXHIBITS**

Kim Long, the 2013 Collections and Exhibits intern, finished her 12 weeks at the Park on July 30. She assisted with the installation of *Food, Water, Shelter: The Business of Yesterday* and created her own exhibit *Time to Play! Victorian Era Merriment* (on display until December) in the 1<sup>st</sup> Floor of the Museum building. We wish her luck in her job search and hope to see her soon!

Collection activities over the last two months have focused on the physical inventory of the Farmhouse Barn, with a planned completion by the end of August. It has taken 3 summers for a dedicated group of volunteers to inventory the nearly 2,000 artifacts stored in the barn. We are grateful to David Chase, Roberta Meeker, Jack Boarts, Sharon Zebrowski, and Mary Brinks for all of their efforts.

Judy Mudge has made headway in the archive, recently finishing a collection of Fortnight newspapers from Hastings High School and Rebecca Kyes is making progress in the ethnographic collection.

In 2014, the Park will host *Dinosaur Prep Lab and Bare Bones - Edmontosaurus Bones on Display,* with

bone cleaning demonstrations and real bones. *Dinosaur Prep Lab* is a traveling exhibit that will be on display at the Park April 7 – June 27, 2014. We are excited to offer our visitors and the residents of Barry County the opportunity to explore the world of dinosaurs with an exhibit by PaleoJoe!
