ARTIFACT ARCHIVE

A Civil War cavalry sword, featured in *The Reminder* July 7th, was recently donated to Historic Charlton Park, and although the Park holds several swords in trust, this one has a very detailed background.

The sword belonged to Thomas Ara Covey, born in 1841 in Batavia, New York, who settled in Hastings during his twenties. He enlisted in Co. L of the 7th Michigan Cavalry on February 28th, 1865 in Battle Creek at the age of 23 as a Private. According to enlistment records Covey was a blacksmith with blue eyes and light hair and complexion, standing 5' 7" tall. Locating Covey in the historical record was challenging due to his preferred appellation; rather than going by his given name "Thomas", he preferred "Ary", a shortened version of his middle name that appears on his enlistment papers and almost all other records. Covey served for approximately a year before being discharged at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas in December 1865. After returning home he married his wife Melissa Howe in 1873, worked on the railroads (1880 Census), and fathered 4 children: Claude Francis, George Wesley, Arthur Leone and Flossie Elena.

Although there is no mention of injuries suffered in his service records, a later document owned by the donor's family indicates that Covey died in 1888 of

wounds received "in the service of the U.S." He is buried in the Hastings Township Cemetery where his tombstone reads "T.A. Covey Co. L. 7 Mich. Cav." His wife Melissa passed a year later, leaving their 4 young children without parents; They were put under the guardianship of a first cousin, Samuel Howe.



The cavalry sword passed from Covey to his children, ending up in his son Arthur's hands (donor's grandfather), then passed to his daughter Viola (Covey) White (donor's mother), and finally to the donor Kenneth White of Grand Rapids, MI. Engraved on the base of the sword's blade is "US G.W.C . 1865", which helps to not only date the artifact, but

also provides manufacture and inspector information. "GWC" stands for George W. Chapin, an inspector for Ames Mfg. Co. of Chicopee, MA. The sword is in wonderful condition, with very little damage incurred through the last 150 years. The sword and additional materials can be viewed in Historic Charlton Park's Upjohn House during regular business hours (M-F, 8 am – 5 pm) until the end of July.
