Claire and Shannon traveled to Muskegon,




Michigan for the Michigan Museums Association annual conference on September 27th and 28th. (photo) They met with museum colleagues from all over the state and attended informative

Many renovation projects have taken place over the last two months. The Mutual Building interior received a fresh coat of paint thanks to the Hastings Mutual Insurance Company and Parker Painting! The Hall House interior was repaired and repainted and the stove was moved further away from the front

door for the safety of our visitors. A good portion of the floor in the back room of the house was also removed and replaced due to water damage. The



boardwalk on the back of the house, which became slippery when it rained, was removed as well. Eaves trough has been installed on the back to curtail any continued water damage and the exterior of the building was also painted. (photo) The Park's maintenance staff was responsible for the work.

The maintenance department has been busy prepping the Park for the upcoming winter, cleaning gutters, mulching leaves, winterizing the restrooms and recreation area. The renovation of the first floor of the



museum building is well underway with most of the sheet rock now on the walls. New board walk entrances have been installed in front of the Carpenter Shop

(photo) and the Hall House. Many dead and down trees have been cut down and cleaned up along the water line and many stumps have been removed.
