### INDIAN LANDING EXCAVATION

The excavation has been going well this season, despite the rain. Volunteers and students have been assisting Dr. Dale Borders with excavation. During the last couple of weeks they have had several exciting finds. One was a



large piece of pottery (picture) with blue sponge de-

sign. The second is a 1863 Indian Head One Cent coin, 49,840,000 were coined at the Philadelphia Mint. The third, a token from Foster & Parry Stoves in Grand Rapids, MI dated c. 1850. "Foster & Parry Dealers in Stoves"



is on the front with an image of a stove, "Dealers in
